
## Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver's mission is to use state of the art technology to find persons with Alzheimer's, autism, Asperger syndrome, Down syndrome, dementia or any other cognitive condition that may cause them to wander and become lost.

A lost person with a cognitive condition represents a critical emergency. They are often unaware of their situation. They may not call out for help and sometimes do not respond to people calling out to them.

Project Lifesaver consists of a bracelet with a personalized radio transmitter. This technology allows Brunswick Police Officers to locate the wearer in the event that they become lost, often with an average rescue time of less than 30 minutes.

This program can help ease the concerns of caregivers who are trying to cope with wandering behaviors.



Since 2014, the Brunswick Police
Department has participated in Project
Lifesaver, a non-profit that trains Law
Enforcement in using electronic tracking
via a special bracelet to locate people with
conditions and disorders like
Alzheimer's, dementia, Down syndrome
or autism, that may cause them to
wander.

Persons with dementia and related disorders are candidates for the bracelets, as well as children with Down syndrome, autism, and other related medical conditions.

What happens when an enrollee wanders?

The caregiver notifies the Brunswick Police Department and a search is initiated using trained and certified tracking personnel. Search times are reduced from hours and days to minutes.
