Legislation by Betsy Mahoney

Federal legislative news

President Biden's Build Back Better bill, that would have provided funds for Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) for many services needed in the autism/intellectual disability community, did not pass. However, negotiations on a revised version of the bill began earlier this month, and advocates believe that funds for HCBS will be included in the new bill. The Autism Society of America is working with congressional allies to keep other disability-related provisions in the bill.

Five members of the Autism Society of Maine will attend (virtually) the annual Disability Policy Seminar in Washington, DC from March 28-30. Seminar topics will include appropriations, HCBS, employment, education, voting, housing, civil rights, Social Security and Supplemental Security Income, affordable and accessible housing and financial security challenges for people with disabilities.

Most importantly, we will be meeting (virtually) with members of the Maine Congressional Delegation, including Senator Angus King, Senator Susan Collins, Congresswoman Chellie Pingree and Congressman Jared Golden. The Autism Society of America will provide guidance to Mainers on the issues to will bring up at these Congressional hill visit meetings.

State legislative news

The second part of the 130th session of the Maine Legislature is more than halfway through. Many of the bills ASM is addressing are actually carry-overs from last spring that have a "fiscal note" attached, meaning that they require state funding. Among the most important is the Governor's budget, because so many of our issues in schools and in supported housing, and community-based service require state funding.

Governor Janet Mills issued her Supplemental budget in February. She noted that the state had a record budget surplus of \$822 million, and she proposed that half of this surplus – \$411 million – be sent back to the people of Maine, which would amount to about \$500 per person.

Funding for MaineCare waiver programs under Sec. 21 (supported housing and day programs) and Sec. 29 (community-based programs) is most important to many of our members. The governor did provide new funding for these programs, including MaineCare increases and bonuses, but it was not enough to address the critical direct service provider wage issues.

Finding enough support workers for people receiving services under MaineCare has long been a serious problem that as only gotten worse over the past couple of years, between the pandemic and the availability of higher paying entry-level jobs at fast food restaurants and discount department stores. As a result, many group homes have closed and more than 25% of the direct care workforce has left the field since the start of the pandemic. (Source: the Maine Association of Community Service Providers)

Last year legislators voted to include in the state budget an increase in MaineCare rates sufficient to pay direct service providers 125% of minimum wage -passed. Unfortunately, the budget that Governor Mills presented did not include enough funds to do that. ASM is working with key members of the Appropriations Committee and other advocacy groups to "fix" this gap.

Education bills

There has been a years-long effort to revise the early childhood education system that serves children with disabilities, and the Advisory Committee on the Independent Review of the State's Early Childhood Special Education Services has been meeting for several years to address this.

Among the proposals are to shift services from the Child Development Services system to school districts and the Maine Department of Education. Another is to assist school districts in billing MaineCare for services for special education students, thus accessing critical federal funds.

Specific bills that would implement parts of the Advisory Committee's recommendation are being developed and there will be an opportunity for public input later in March. ASM will offer testimony.

Project Lifesaver

Since 2014, the Brunswick Police Department has participated in Project Lifesaver, a non-profit that trains Law Enforcement in using electronic tracking via a special bracelet to locate people with conditions and disorders like Alzheimer's, dementia, Down Syndrome or Autism, that may cause them to wander.

Project Lifesaver's mission is to use the state-of-the-art technology to find person with Alzheimer's, Autism, Down Syndrome, dementia, or any other cognitive condition that may cause them to wander to and become lost.

A lost person with a cognitive condition presents a critical emergency. They are often unaware of their situation. They may not call out for help and sometimes do not respond to people calling out to them.

Project Lifesaver consists of a bracelet with a personalized radio transmitter. This technology allows Brunswick Police Officers to locate the wearer in the event that they become lost, often with an average rescue time of less than 30 minutes.





This program can help ease the concerns of caregivers who are trying to cope with wandering behaviors.
