The Fraternal Order of Eagles is an international nonprofit organization uniting fraternally in the spirit of liberty, truth, justice, and equality, to make human life more desirable by lessening its ills and promoting peace, prosperity, gladness, and hope.

The F.O.E. was founded in February 1898 by six theatre owners gathered in a Seattle shipyard to discuss a musicians' strike. After addressing the matter, they agreed to "bury the hatchet" and form "The Order of Good Things." As numbers grew, members selected the Bald Eagle as the official emblem and changed the name to "The Fraternal Order of Eagles." This introduction ©Copyright 2023 Fraternal Order of Eagles.

The Fraternal Order of Eagles includes nearly 800,000 members and more than 1,500 locations across the U.S. and Canada.

As we understand, transitions are hard for people on the spectrum no matter their age. We hope to see many of you there this year.

Our second opening is for a legislative leader to work on supporting ASM at the state house. This is a remote job. Please reach out to Cathy if you are interested in either of these positions.

Back in the fall of 2022, I was contacted by Joel Hersom, who at the time was the State President for Maine Fraternal Order of Eagles and he wanted to inform the society that he, as State President chose the Autism Society of Maine as the charity for the year. That means that all the 14 Aerie's would be contributing to this chosen charity. The Aerie's also support many other worthy causes throughout the year. In fact, this past year, donations coming from Maine totaled over \$44,000. Learning all that this wonderful organization does for their local communities and charitable giving was incredibly heartfelt. I did get to meet several of the Aerie's at their annual State Convention held in Waterboro on June 10th. There was a lovely reception held at Waterboro Aerie where the installation of officers happened, and then the state dinner.

One speaker was Thomas McGrath, who is the Field Service Manager with the Grand Aerie Fraternal Order of Eagles. He spoke about one of the charities that was established in 2014. The Fraternal Order of Eagles completed a \$25 million pledge to the University of Iowa to fund the Fraternal Order of Eagles Diabetes Research Center, a comprehensive research facility dedicated to progressing diabetes research in hopes of one day finding a cure. It was a very impressive undertaking, and the progress they are making is incredible.

After listening to Thomas, I was invited to say a few words on behalf of ASM and what it means to ASM for this donation. The group of two hundred individuals who sat and listened to what ASM does in Maine and how all funds stay in our state were very welcoming and pleased with what ASM does for families. The next part of the meeting was utterly amazing as I sat and watched each group come forward (all fourteen of them) and make their donations to various charities one by one. I was not keeping track of how much was being donated to ASM, but it was honoring to sit there and have each Aerie say to whom their donations were going. Most of the groups came up and had 5 to 12 different checks to donate to. They all encouraged each other and there was plenty of camaraderie to go around. The evening ended with lots of dancing and cocktails.

After all is said and done the Fraternal Order of Eagles donated to the Autism Society of Maine of \$23,379! I encourage anyone to check out a FOE near you.



Angela J. joins the team from Washington County and works in a variety of fields including: firefighter, BHP, and in Special Education as a paraprofessional. She is a mom of 3, including a teenage son diagnosed with ASD and another teenage son diagnosed w ADHD. She also has guardianship of an adult special lady who has Cerebral Palsy.

Back to School!



The Autism Society of America and Nickelodeon co-created a free, downloadable, **Back-to-School resource pack** to help support students on the Autism spectrum and their teachers. Free to download, print, and customize with the support of your favorite characters, including: Spongebob Squarepants, Blue's Clue's, Bubble Guppies, Fairly Odd Parents, Paw Patrol, Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, Dora the Explorer, Peppa Pig, and Loud House.

- **Power Cards:** A "Power Card" is a visual aid that uses a person's interest as motivation to help teach a skill, encourage action, or set reminders. Power cards (featuring your favorite Nick characters) use a student's high-interest topic/passion to help encourage positive choices, set reminders, and support engagement.
- **Token Boards:** A token board is a visual support tool that provides reinforcement and supports self-management. They allow unstructured tasks to be broken down into clear and visual steps and support motivation and engagement through positive reinforcement using images of high interests/passions that are meaningful to the student.
- **Visual Schedules:** Visual schedules offer visual support that can help Autistic individuals set a routine, anticipate/foreshadow daily activities, transition between activities, develop independence, and can be used as a communication tool. Visual supports can also help the student process information easier and quicker.
- Two visual schedule formats are provided, one intended for younger students with larger images and one intended for older students with a more varied daily schedule. The resource pack can be used across all age ranges and should be personalized to support student agency and engagement.

Halloween can be a lot to handle for children with Autism. All the sights and sounds can be scary and overwhelming! There are many alternatives to the traditional door-to-door trick or treat routines - like organized community events or even a candy treasure hunt in the safety of your own home. The possibilities are endless! We have put together a "Halloween Tips & Strategies" page on the ASM website that can be helpful for going out, crafts, games, and snacks. Here are a few tips:

Safety

- Make sure your child always has some form of identification on them and a way to communicate that they are lost.
- Use glow-in-the-dark tape on your child's costume and yours too for night-time visibility.
- Wear something that distinguishes you from the crowd so your child can easily find you.

Costumes

- Keep it comfortable, check out the pajama section of the store for comfortable pajamas that look like costumes.
- Make it simple, too many accessories can complicate things and cause sensory overload.

Prepare

- Use social stories or visuals schedules to help prepare your child for Halloween.
- Practice step-by-step while wearing costume, ringing the doorbell or knocking at the door, have someone open the door, receiving candy, expressing thank you, etc.

Candy

- Teach your child not to eat anything they get from trick-or-treating without your permission.
- Exchange candy for treats that are safe for them to eat.
